FROM THE CHAIR

It's the fall and many are focusing their attention on the upcoming Cursillo Three-Day weekends. One of the key elements to the success of the Cursillo movement is good sponsorship. Candidates benefit most when they arrive "well prepared".

How does one prepare a candidate? Start with prayer, lots of prayer. Then explain the weekend, the <u>whole</u> weekend. Remember, the substance of the threeday weekend is contained in the fifteen rollos and the five meditations. Tell your candidates the topics of each rollo and that the purpose is to better equip Christians as a member of a Christian community working to reach others for Christ. Carefully explain that each talk is followed by a period of discussion. If your candidate is not comfortable in a table group setting, perhaps Cursillo is not right at this time. Please remember that Cursillo is not a secret society; there are no secrets. Answer all the candidates' questions openly and honestly.

You <u>must</u> explain to your candidates the requirement to attend the Fourth Day program following the women's weekend. Most importantly, you are responsible for helping your new cursillistas to become established in a group reunion. It is in grouping that Christians are strengthened on a continuing basis to do the apostolic work of the Lord. If you are not grouping, your actions will speak louder than all the rollos combined.

I am excited about the work that has been accomplished in the Servant Community over the summer and is continuing into the fall. Some of the notable accomplishments are:



ARE WE GROWING?

On the warm sand of the seashore, Dr. Oliver Wendell Holmes found a curiously-shaped empty shell. In that shell had lived a little sea animal called the "nautilus". When the nautilus starts out in life as a baby, it has only a tiny shell, much like a one-room cabin. As the nautilus grows, it builds a larger section to its original shell and moves into those more spacious quarters. Then it erects a pearly wall behind itself, sealing off forever its previous stage. The nautilus adds a new chamber to its shell each time it outgrows its old one. Its shell forms a spiral of gradually enlarging compartments in which the creature lives as it grows larger and larger. As Dr. Holmes pondered that empty, spiral shell, he was inspired to write a poem called "The Chambered Nautilus". In that poem, he compared the human personality to that little nautilus, compelled to keep on growing and expanding. "Build thee more stately mansions, O my soul, as the swift seasons roll! Leave thy low-vaulted past!" When we cease to grow, we begin to die!

That word *grow* comes from the Indo-European root *ghro*, which means "to grow, to turn green". Long before God put into Moses' mind and hand the Ten Commandments, God gave His original command to all His living creatures: "Be fruitful...multiply...grow!" As human beings we are called to grow in four directions suggested by the four letters of the word *grow*: in our understanding of <u>G</u>od; in the quality of our <u>R</u>elationships; in the development of <u>O</u>urselves; in the mastery of our <u>W</u>orld. Psychologist Rollo May has said: "The human being cannot live in a condition of

emptiness for very long; if he is not growing toward something, he does not merely stagnate. The pent-up potentialities turn into morbidity and despair, and eventually into destructive activities and attitudes".

Is Cursillo as a movement growing in our diocese? Is it growing in our parish? Are we as individuals growing within the movement and helping others to grow?

We need to grow because it is God's plan for every Christian. Here are five "rules" from the Cursillo Farmer's Almanac for growth:

1. Get in right relationship with God...by personal devotions, examination of conscience, penance.

2. Feed on the Word of God...by Bible reading and study.

3. Pray....by keeping in continual communion with Christ who is the breath of life.

4. Rest...by not being anxious, since all is in God's hands. Be watered and restored by group reunions and ultreyas.

5. Work and witness....by apostolic action.

A witness is one who tells what he knows to someone who needs to hear it. Witnessing keeps the prayer life alive and up-todate. It also challenges us to dig into the Scriptures in search of answers for those to whom we are witnessing.

Have we been growing since we went on our first Cursillo week end ? Are we glorifying God more this week than last week in our homes and various environments? By God's grace let us all be like trees planted by the river bearing much fruit for Christ. Let the world see what the Lord can make of us, with the Bible and faith and prayer and the Holy Spirit, if we do His will and trust in His love and care.

A NATIONAL PERSPECTIVE

As San Diego's representative on the National Episcopal Cursillo Committee (NECC), I would like to bring you up to date on what's going on nationally in this what I consider a pivotal year for Cursillo. First, we are seeking to become more involved in the Church's 2020 Initiative. For those who may not be familiar with this, it is an initiative of the Episcopal Church of the United States of America to double in size by the year 2020. Obviously we don't have to do it all, but we do need to make a significant contribution. Our three-legged stool of Piety, Study, and Action which, by the way, the Catholic Cursillo Community has changed to Holiness, Formation, and Evan*gelization* - focuses us on the *Action* portion. And that *Action* portion is meant to be *Evangelization*. As Presiding Bishop Griswold has said, If our Piety doesn't lead us to Action, if our Study doesn't lead us to Action, then they are both useless. We say we are called to make a friend, be a friend, and bring that friend to Christ. That we must continue to do. But some of the friends we bring to Christ should also spillover into the Episcopal Church. If that isn't happening, perhaps we shouldn't be Episcopalians ourselves.

Next, we are proposing a change to our By-Laws to allow for a fourth year President with no Diocesan responsibilities. This will allow the President to focus on fund raising and policy matters without being overloaded. This is an important change and, I think, a much needed one. But this should be discussed at our local level, and whomever we send to the National Seminar this year as our representative should vote the mind of the San Diego Cursillo Community at the General Council Meeting, which is part of every Seminar. Next, in 2003 we will become even more involved with National Cursillo. In January we will host the NECC for their regular quarterly meeting. We expect to have an Ultreya at St Dunstan's on Friday evening 17 January, and very possibly some of the NECC will attend Back to the Mountain the weekend before. Then in October 2003 we will again host the National

Seminar at the Handlery Hotel in Mission Valley. This will be a great time for all of us to get acquainted with the entire National Cursillo Program. Bob and Janet Shaw will be our Local Coordinators for the Seminar. If you would like to volunteer to help them in any way, please let Janet or Bob know.

Finally, the Rev. Maryanne Lacey has volunteered, and our Secretariat has endorsed her, to relieve me as the next Western District Clergy Representative to the NECC after October 2002. I am delighted with this. I've loved the job, but my three years will be up this October, and it's really time for a turnover. May God continue to bless you all. Ultreya!

Advent

Our Lord is coming! From ages past humankind has ached with longing for some power to set things right, to calm the beast, curb the tyrant, and bring peace to the soul. We have longed for YOU, Lord, and we listened for YOUR promises - to give us hope – until promises gave birth to God–with-us – Immanuel – YOU come, Lord Jesus!

Our Lord is coming here and now – in the proclamation of the Good News, in the sharing of the Bread and Wine, in the Word of forgiveness, in the fellowship of the Church, in the needs of neighbors, and from YOUR Spirit burning within us. Now, today, here, God is with us...YOU come, Lord Jesus!

Our Lord is coming for Tomorrow. Hope! (Our hands empty and open): God will fill the hungry; God will raise those laid low. God will make creation right. Imagine! (Our eyes closed, hearts open): Our Lord returning in glory; Our Lord judging the peoples; Our Lord sharing His glory. Go! (Boldly and unafraid): step into tomorrow without calendar or map or watch. Walk toward eternity from this place and time. YOU will come, Lord Jesus, God-with-us!

A refresher course on Advent words and signs:

Advent is a Latin word that means a "coming" or "arrival". It refers to our Lord's coming at Christmas – at the end of our four-week preparation – as well as His coming today in the Christian community, and His coming at the end of time.

The Angel Gabriel announced to Mary and Joseph that they would experience the miraculous birth of a child. He would be God-with-us and he would save his people from their sin.

A Crown symbolizes the King of Glory, Jesus Christ, who left His position in glory to enter our world as God-with-us and who will come again in glory to judge the world.

Candles, often in an Advent wreath, celebrate the *Light of the Word*, God's Son, who overcomes the darkness and the long winter of our souls.

Emmanuel or Immanuel is a Hebrew word meaning "God is with us." Isaiah the prophet promised again and again that the Lord would come to be with His people. As a sign of this promise, the son in Isaiah 7:10 was called "God is with us."

Maranatha! Is an Aramaic word meaning "Come, Lord!" The earliest Christians shouted this word in their worship. They meant that they were ready to welcome Jesus on His return as Lord of the Universe. Listen to our Advent prayers – collects- each Sunday where we cry, "Stir up your power, O Lord, and come!"

Purple or blue is the color of Advent, signifying royalty and, in part, repentance. This palette is interrupted with a pink candle in the Advent wreath on the third Sunday – "Rejoice Sunday" – from a key word in the liturgy.

Take time this year to observe Advent. Listen to the message of the Scriptures – the prophetic words of Isaiah and hear Jesus' own words as he predicts His return to gather the chosen few at the last day, This year – **CELEBRATE AD-VENT!** And don't forget that <u>forgotten</u> Season – **CHRISTMAS!** In the Church Year this is that short season that slips by unnoticed. This is the 12 days between December 25 and Epiphany on January 6. Too often these days are filled with holiday travel, parties and recuperation. In quiet moments, take time to truly reflect on the miracle of Christ's birth. This year celebrate Christmas for the season – not just the day.

Food is provided by the Camp Stevens staff. Just bring a sleeping bag, flashlight, towel, bible, song book and warm clothing.

The weekend begins at 7:00 PM on Friday, January 10, 2002 and ends at noon on Sunday, January 12. Please note that the weekend is the second weekend of the year.

What does it cost?
