FROM THE CHAIR

Hello All,

I'm going to do something a little different and take a step into diocese politics and how it is likely to affect our community. Normally, I would avoid politics at the diocesan level like the plague. It tends to be too much squabbling over foolishness. (If you don't believe me, pick up and read the proposed resolutions from the last diocese convention. Now explain to me how any of them would assist or support the salvation of anybody.)

I have probably lost a significant amount of my audience already. Of course, the reason I'm willing to put large amounts of time and energy into sustaining the Cursillo community is that I can see the presence of God working within our community so that all come away with a better understanding of his grace and love and therefore a better understanding of salvation.

At first pass, it may not seem that Cursillo should care much about the upcoming bishop election. We are pretty much self-sustaining. We do not need diocese funds for support. However, this would be naive on several counts. First of all, we exist at the pleasure of the bishop, whoever that may be. If he does not see a real and tangible benefit to our existence, it is within his rights to shut us down. Second, by being physically present, the bishop adds a level of credibility that is hard to come by otherwise. Bishop Hughes has invested a significant time commitment to make it to many of our closings. How many of us were both impressed and surprised when we first came into the cafe-

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teria for Closura that our bishop had made the hour journey up the hill for a fairly short Eucharist (that may or may not start on time)? Also, it is with the consultation of the bishop that we develop both our pastoral plan and long range goals. Finally, the bishop selects the spiritual director who is responsible for insuring that the clergy teams remain balanced and accurately reflect our diocese as a whole. Again, when we fell slightly off track on this last one, Gethin gathered all the revival movements together to insure that they understood what is acceptable behavior.

So if I had a vote as chair of Cursillo, what qualities would I desire? First, I would look for somebody who understood the benefits of a vibrant renewal community. Second, I would look for somebody who was willing to put in the time to keep it that way. Finally, I would look for somebody who recognizes that Cursillo is inherently neither conservative or liberal and would take steps to insure that the leadership does not become too slanted one way or the other. (It would be a tragedy if the leadership became such that parishes within the diocese no longer felt comfortable contributing or sending candidates.)

A STATEMENT ON CURSILLO

The decisions reached at the recent General Convention in Minneapolis have caused some division in the Episcopal Church. Some dioceses, congregations, and individuals are curtailing giving to the national church; some people have resigned their ministries and leadership positions. Some have left the church; others are likely to follow, though how many no one knows. With this happening, it would be irresponsible of us as stewards of the Cursillo movement not to deal with possibilities.

As we discuss where we are and what the future might hold, the following realities impress themselves upon the NECC.

Regardless of permutations in institutions, Cursillo has always kept its eyes firmly focused on Jesus and on the Mission. One of the principles of the Cursillo movement is that:

We focus on Christ and His resurrection power in our lives, transforming us into the people He would have us be. Theological and political issues have no part of our agenda.

This movement is neither liberal nor conservative. It is Christ-centered and Christ-focused. We must keep this in mind and heart as we do what responsibility calls us to do in considering future possibilities and possible adjustments to them.

The policy of the NEC/NECC is that it will not be a political or social agenda organization. It is a movement of the Episcopal Church. The NECC should not attempt to understand the implications of the as yet uncertain organizational and financial transformations in ECUSA. There are many issues that we do not influence.

What is clear is that NEC was created to serve the Episcopal Church in the United States, and we are licensed by the Roman Catholic Church to do that. Despite our personal theological and political views, we are focused on knowing Christ and making him known to others. That is our call and in doing it lies our greatest joy. Ultreya! Ultreya!!

Let's get on with the day's apostolic action. Let's all pray for the church, the Church, and one another every day.

Why is Jesus Christ Good News for You?

The word "gospel" means "good news" and the Gospel according to Mark begins with these words, "The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God." We believe as Christians that Jesus Christ was Good News 2,000 years ago, is Good News today and will be Good News in the future. But many non-Christians do not see Jesus Christ as being good news for them personally, but just as a great religious teacher. The bottom line for non-Christians is that they believe that there is little or no benefit in believing in, "Jesus Christ, the Son of God." And to believe in Jesus Christ is to believe that he is the Son of God, and to reject Jesus as the Son of God is not to believe in Him at all. Let's frame the basic question that needs to be answered for our friends who are skeptical. Question: What practical good does it do for me to believe in Jesus Christ?

Truth about yourself.

To believe in Jesus breaks down our false ideas and illusions about who we really are. To know the truth about yourself is an essential building block for a successful life. Jesus is God's standard of truth for humanity.

Forgiveness and freedom from guilt.

We can do evil. We can even hurt the people we love. Self-justification and rationalization do not work. We need God's forgiveness and Jesus brings us God's forgiveness by dying on the cross to forgive our sins. One of the greatest things in life is to truly know that you are forgiven.

Power to Change.

To believe in Jesus Christ gives us the power to change ourselves and to some extent, society. To his believers, Jesus sends the Holy Spirit that brings about the miracles that change us. Secular self-improvement programs are quick to tell you what to do, but they don't give you the power to do it. We struggle with weakness of the will; we often know what needs to be done but do not have the power to do it. We need the power to change and Jesus gives us this power through the Holy Spirit.

Better Relationships.

To believe in Jesus does not give us perfect relationships, but it does improve our relationships. We also make new friends in the church and so we also have more relationships. Jesus has a way of opening our eyes to see things in our relationships.

God's plan for your life.

To believe in Jesus is to let your life unfold as your creator intended, rather than by our small-minded plans. God's plan is much better than our plan.

Christian home for your kids.

To believe in Jesus gives the parents better values and thus helps their kids to have better values. A Christian home has a different culture than a secular home.

Ministry.

To believe in Jesus is to want to serve Jesus by doing ministry. By helping build up others in Christ, you yourself are built up. You not only change the lives of others, but you are changed. Ministry is a very practical good that results in everyone being changed.

Stewardship.

To believe in Jesus includes being a steward of our money and other possessions. Stewardship is not just giving money to the church; that's part of it. Stewardship means being a money manager for God with all of your money. People who believe in Jesus and practice stewardship often make better financial decisions, spending money on what's really important. Being a believer in Jesus may not make you rich, but it will help you to be a better money manager.

Eternal life.

The greatest benefit of all in believing in Jesus is to be sure that you will have eternal life.

All of the above is extremely good news. To believe in Jesus Christ gives us real benefits. Jesus Christ is good news for you!!

I reminded him of the old hymn, "What A Friend We Have in Jesus." and that this had helped me through many trying times. The next thing I knew was that they were back together and very happy.

Recently, he called on a Thursday afternoon and asked if there was anything he could do for me. So I asked him to help me install my new radio gear. When he got to my place we decided how to install it. He called me Friday afternoon and said that he had been unable to find the proper materials. I invited him for breakfast on Saturday with other friends. Then we could go to my place from there.

The next morning he did not show up for breakfast. About 9:30 my phone rang and I was thinking of giving a smart aleck answer; but something told me not to. "This is Doug's wife and Doug had a brain aneurism and died." I was devastated. "May I pray with you?" At his service, I told how Doug and I had met and the plans we had made for "last" Saturday. But the Lord changed our plans and took him home. I said, "It is very important to have a relationship with Jesus because we don't know whether there will be a tomorrow or not. For Doug and me there was no tomorrow...." His wife was sitting right in front of me with tears running down her face. I gave her a big hug and blessed her. She hugged me back and told me that the turning point in Doug's life was my praying for him.

So you see, my friends, you never know how the Lord is going to use you in apostolic action. We need to be on our toes and always be ready to witness for our Lord.

ELEVATOR SPEECH

When my boss was recently discussing with us the need to prepare a concise summary of some material, she said "Turn it into an *elevator speech*." By that she meant for us to prioritize the most important points and then to arrange them into a brief summary that could be delivered in the time it takes to ride up the elevator (our building only has four floors).

The idea is to have focused so completely and so intently upon the main points of the subject matter that you can clearly and concisely convey them to another person in a very short period of time. It's a useful concept to consider in sales (whether you are selling Girl Scout cookies or multi-million dollar aircraft). How can I use a very few words to get another person to be focused upon, and interested in, what I have to say? The exercise of developing an elevator speech about yourself is very useful when preparing for a job interview or a promotion.

What would Cursillo's elevator speech be?

Our usual approach in trying to provide a summary of Cursillo is to focus on "the weekend". We recall the many friendships, the music, the laughter, the tears – and that great sense of being a part of a special community in a spirit filled environment. Our Cursillo elevator speech could easily turn into a sales pitch for the Cursillo weekend.

But that would be to miss the main point of Cursillo which is the Fourth Day and especially the reunion group. Weekends are great, but weekends end. And then we must leave the comfortable surroundings of St. Columba (or wherever the weekend is held) and return to the "real world" where real life goes on. The point of Cursillo is not to put on great weekends; it is to provide a method for our living a Christian pattern of life in that real world. That pattern – framed in our Rule of Life – will be most successfully followed when we live alongside a group of other engaged Christians who can provide one another with encouragement, support, accountability and companionship.

So what might that Cursillo elevator speech be?

"Cursillo provided me with a helpful itinerary for how to live my life as a Christian. It's a straightforward method presented during a weekend 'retreat' that was fun and very meaningful. But most importantly Cursillo provided me with a small group of close companions and a large supportive community to walk with me and to keep me on track along the way."

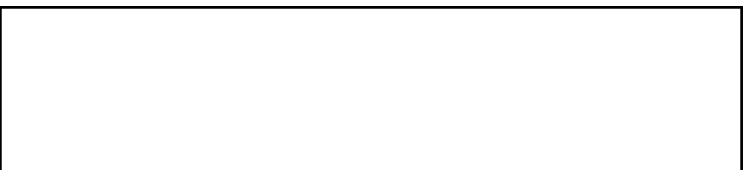
