#### From the Spiritual Advisor

If the world comes to an end on December 21, how will I be able to open my Christmas presents on December 25?

Many people are talking about December 21, 2012 as the date the world will come to an end, because this is the date the Mayan calendar supposedly comes to an end. The end of the world has fascinated people today as it has down through the ages. The topic of the end of the world is good material for a sensational movie or news story. All it takes is for someone to come up with some reason for the world to end in the near future and to pick a specific date. Then the controversy can begin; it is all so entertaining.

But if we think about the end of the world, not as entertainment or controversy, but as a serious theological topic, then it may shed light on our lives today. What if we further ask, "what does Christmas have to do with the end of the world?" Let us begin answering these questions, by stating what Jesus tells us, that no one knows the time, nor the season when the world will end. It is futile to speculate about the time of the end of the world. But it is very useful to remember that the world will end. Both science and the Bible agree that the world will end; there is no doubt that this will happen. Knowing that the world will end helps us to look at the world in a different way. It is only a temporary reality; it is not permanent and ultimate reality. So often in our daily lives, we deceive ourselves into believing that the world is the ultimate reality. We can so easily slip into living for the things of this world, for material things. What we need to live for is ultimate reality, which is found in Jesus Christ. He is the ultimate and permanent reality of God come among us. The God who created our world came into our world in the person of Jesus Christ. In him, we will find the ultimate purpose and meaning for our lives, not in the temporary reality of the world.

If the world comes to an end, it is futile to try to make worldly things the ultimate goal of life. The finite and temporal cannot give ultimate meaning and purpose to our lives. But Jesus Christ, who lives forever, can give ultimate purpose and meaning to our lives.

Bishop Mathes fully supports the Cursillo Movement in the Diocese so much so that he has designed one Sunday a year to be called Cursillo Sunday. January 20, 2013 has been designated as Cursillo Sunday.

The Bishop's hope is that the message of Cursillo is proclaimed on this day. Cursillo began in 1945 in Spain as a way to bring men back into the church. It has evolved from the Catholic Church to the Episcopal Church.

Cursillo is an intensive three day "short course in Christianity." It is not a secret club, a sect, or an organization you have to be asked to attend. What it is is a wonderful spirit-filled way to reconnect with your Christianity. There is no cost to attend, you are sponsored by a current Cursillista and recommended by your pastor.

Please take the time to look over our brochures, ask your parish representative or any one you know who has attended a Cursillo weekend about their experience.

The next weekend will be held at Camp Stevens in Julian from April 25 – April 28, 2013.
