

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR

Greetings from the chair,

This year's secretariat is off and running, but before I tell you what we're up to I want to recognize Judy Brown for the excellent job she's done leading your "vestry" over the last year. Let's hear it for Judy!

At the Ultreya at Saint Tim's the Cursillo community voted in five new Secretariat members: Larry Salvadori, Karen Rice, Justin Jordan, Mercedes Weber and Rev. Steve Wendfeldt. They join existing members: Judy Brown, Rev. Ed. Busch, Judy Anderson, Ed Embick, Susan Miller and Rev. Babs. Meairs. I am humbled by the combination of talent, experience and enthusiasm that your Secretariat represents.

We welcomed in the New Year with a Secretariat retreat at the home of Susan & Victor Miller. The theme this year was "Inclusivity," or how to expand our participation in non-traditional directions. In praying for guidance on choosing a theme (I didn't even know that was my job until Father George suggested it!) I noted that you had elected two people who represent communities into which we want to expand – youth, in the person of Justin, and cross-cultural, in the person of Mercedes. We will be putting both to work to help us reach out into those candidate pools! I think those of you who worked Cursillo #132 will agree that the inclusion (there's that word) of several new Spanish-speaking Cursillistas enriched the weekend and strengthened the ties that bind us together.

Last year we voted to drop from our Pastoral Plan language that restricted candidates to "leaders," as a better understanding of one's relationship with Christ may be what it takes to *make* someone a leader. Also, because of the demise of Vocare, we voted to lower the age limit from 21 to 18. We recognize that for that to work, we have to recruit more than one young person for any given weekend, or they may feel out of place with the rest of us dinosaurs; and they must be mature young people. We already have some infrastructure in place to welcome Hispanic candidates (translators, Spanish songs and Prayer Books... and the very origin and vocabulary of our ministry), so we'll limit our multi-cultural expansion to that demographic for the time being.

So let's work together this year to build upon the progress we've already made in opening our arms to these communities!

"Then I saw a great white throne and one who sat on it"

(Revelation 20:11)

On our recent vacation to Lake Tahoe, Nancy and I drove into Reno, Nevada to pick up our daughter, Jill, from the airport. We arrived in Reno early, so as to have plenty of time to go through what is left of Bill Harrah's classic car collection. As I walked through the museum, my mind went back to the 1970's when, as a teen, I walked from one massive warehouse to another, spending the entire day trying to see all of what was then the largest classic car collection in the world.

Bill Harrah died suddenly of an aneurysm at the age of 66. In a few seconds, he went from owning more and better cars than anyone else, to owning nothing. He went from living his life his own way to standing before the throne of God. He went from being admired as a highly successful businessman to a man without glory standing before God's judgment. As far as we know, Bill Harrah lived his life pursuing more and more money, beautiful women and classic cars. He seemed not to be interested in being used by God's purposes on earth. He was not interested in fulfilling God's mission, but only in satisfying his own desires.

Bill Harrah's life should serve as a warning to us; true life is not about collecting more cars, or other things, than anyone else. The person who dies with the most toys does not win in the game of life. The person who wins at the game of life is the person who offers one's own life to God, seeking to fulfill God's purposes and not just one's own desires. We can only have real life when we are living within the purposes of God.

We know what God's purposes are for our lives when we seek to serve Jesus Christ. In the person and work of Christ, we find God's purposes for our lives and then, life itself.

As we come to Jesus Christ, we become the agents of His mission out into the world. We see ourselves as his missionaries to a world that needs to find life in His name.

Someday, you will stand before the great white throne and the One who sits on it. What you have done with your life is important in the eyes of God. Have you lived your life only for your own desires, or have you lived your life for God's purposes?


