FROM THE DIOCESAN CURSILLO SPIRITUAL ADVISOR

The Existential Vacuum

Victor Frankl (1905-1997) was one of the great psychiatrists of the Twentieth Century. He made an interesting discovery while an inmate in a concentration camp during World War II. Physically stronger people were dying while less strong people were having a higher chance of surviving. Why? He discovered that the physically weaker people who were religious and therefore believed that God had a purpose and meaning for their lives survived. Those who were able to hang on to meaning in their lives through inner-spiritual riches were given strength that helped them. But of the people who were quickly dying in the concentration camp, they did not believe there was any meaning to life. Under the extreme conditions of the concentration camp, only one out of twenty-eight people survived; under this tremendous stress, it became clear that meaning was as important to life as oxygen. Almost everything about the concentration camp was working to rob people of meaning; in other words, the camp became a dehumanizing force. An inmate felt like they were an animal or a cog in the cruel Nazi machine. If life feels like it has no meaning, why continue living? Frankl came up with a formula that can be summed up in one sentence: "Despair is suffering, minus meaning."

Frankl came up with another interesting insight while in the concentration camp. The concentration camp did not begin with government bureaucrats in Berlin. It began with a world view that was advocated by philosophers and scientists that formed a cultural background that made it possible for the concentration camp to exist. A philosophical view emerged of human beings as being merely a machine or an animal and not a spiritual person seeking to fulfill the meaning of their lives. This philosophy can be summed up in one word: nihilism. To be nihilistic is to reject all religious and moral principles in the belief that life is meaningless. Hidden within the culture was a nihilistic view of human beings. For example, psychiatrists tended to view their patients as animal or machine prescribing medications to fix a physical malfunction in the brain without addressing their need for meaning. The psychiatrist may think that physiology is important and that spirituality is unimportant. There may be a reductionistic, materialist philosophy at work in the psychiatrist's thinking. The psychiatrist may subtly hold a nihilistic view of his or her patient, inadvertently pushing moral and spiritual issues away. In doing so, they are denying the essential role that meaning plays in their patient's life. It's ironic that a psychiatrist wound up in a concentration camp suffering from having the meaning sucked out of his life, but it was under these conditions that he discovered the importance of meaning.

What do Frankl's insights have to do with us today? We live in an increasingly secular culture that is driving out religious and moral principles that give meaning to life. We have philosophers and scientists that can tend towards reducing human beings down to the machine and animal level. Many people today overlook the importance of seeing a human as a spiritual being who must find meaning in his or her life. The nihilism in our culture is hidden and subtle; it is not explicitly proclaimed with neon lights. We are spiritual beings who seek meaning; we need to transcend ourselves to find meaning. We are self-transcendent beings. We must transcend the self into a larger world of meaning if we are to live.

As Christians, we transcend ourselves by giving ourselves to God. But for the person living a secular life, the hidden nihilism gets in the way of this process of self-transcendence into a larger meaning. The nihilism in our lives creates what Victor Frankl calls the existential vacuum, an inner emptiness. At the center of a person's being is a vacuum, a hole that the person is longing to fill. The person feels bored without meaning. They may feel anxious or depressed and not understand why they feel this way. Frankl calls this feeling of depression from the existential vacuum "the Sunday neurosis." This neurosis happens on Sunday when a person is sitting at home or some other place with the busy activities of the week done; they have free time to think about their life, but they do not know what to think or do. They just feel depressed. They are longing to fill the vacuum so they will feel better. They may think that what they need is "stuff" to fill the hole.

They may submerge themselves in passive entertainment or an addiction may rush in to fill the vacuum or even an inappropriate seeking of pleasure or a deep psychological problem may surface. We will seek to fill the vacuum with something.

Long before Victor Frankl's insights, Blaise Pascal (1623-1662) called this vacuum a God-shaped hole. He said, "... this infinite abyss can be filled only with an infinite and immutable object; in other words, by God himself." *Pensées* 7 (425). As Christians, we know that God's presence is what we need to fill this vacuum. God's presence and grace need to be at the center of our lives.

Jesus said, "I came that they might have life and they might have it abundantly." What Jesus is saying is that he brings God's presence into our life so that our life may be full and meaningful. When our life is full of God's presence and meaning, we experience abundant life. No longer are we trying to do a hopeless task of filling an existential vacuum, but Jesus tells us what we need to do: "If anyone is thirsty, let him come and drink who believes in me." Jesus promises that he will give us living water. Jesus pours the living water, which is the Holy Spirit, inside of us. This living water of the Holy Spirit supernaturally, miraculously, guides us into meaning and understanding of our lives. We are being lifted by Jesus into a larger and more wonderful life than anything we can try to come up with by ourselves. We no longer need to feel despair over living a meaningless life. Instead, we are experiencing the loving presence and work of God's living water inside of us. Hallelujah! We don't live a life of empty existential nothingness; we live the abundant life filled with the living water of the Holy Spirit! Come, Holy Spirit! Come, and fill your lamb! Come, fill me with your living water.
