A MESSAGE FROM THE DIOCESAN CURSILLO SPIRITUAL ADVISOR

The Apostle's Creed: A Minimal Outline of the Salvation Story

1. I believe in God the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.
2. I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord.
3. He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary.
4. Under Pontius Pilate, He was crucified, died, and was buried.
5. He descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again.
6. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father.
7. He will come again to judge the living and the dead.
8. I believe in the Holy Spirit,
9. the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints,
10. the forgiveness of sins,
11. the resurrection of the body,
12. and the life everlasting. Amen.

We (not just the people in the Bible) are actors in the salvation story. It's important that we see ourselves as part of the salvation story. The salvation story must be our story as well. We can do this by inserting ourselves into the creed. Our life experiences and the salvation story intersect one another. I would like to tell you about my story and insert it into the creed, so that you can insert your own story into the creed.

I should mention that you have already committed yourself to be part of the salvation story in your Baptismal Covenant. In the Book of Common Prayer on page 304 you or your sponsors promised to continue in the apostles' teaching, fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers. In other words, you have promised to uphold the apostles' teaching and continue the apostles' work through the church. The apostles' teaching and work are contained in the Apostle's Creed.

Here is my salvation story as it intersects with the Apostles Creed:

1. **I believe in God the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.**

I was born on February 19, 1956 at Mercy Hospital here in San Diego. I entered this world and became part of God's creation. Of course, I was already part of God's creation some time in 1955 inside my mother's womb, but when I came out of the womb, I entered a world that God created full of wonder and possibility. As part of God's creation, I know that God has a plan for my life, that my life is not just an accident, but

there is purpose and meaning behind my life because God is the creator of the universe, in fact, He made me of star dust. When I look back at my birth out of my personal relationship with God, and I look at the words of the creed, I am thankful that I am part of God's creation. Deep within me I am thankful for God for making me.

2. **I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord.**

I first learned about who Jesus was in Sunday School. I am thankful to my teachers who told me about Jesus, but Jesus is not just an idea. He is a risen, living, being. I am most thankful for when Jesus came into my life during my conversion experience at the age of fourteen and I knew him as my own savior. Jesus was not just an idea to me, but a living reality inside of me. When I say the words, "I believe in Jesus Christ," I say it out of a living relationship with Christ. Jesus is my Lord. I know him and I love him, and I serve him as my Lord.

3. **He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary.**

This statement of the creed became important to me when I was attending All Saints in Hillcrest and, for the first time, celebrated Christmas by attending a solemn high mass. The rituals with incense and the splendor of the mass brought home to me how important the incarnation of Christ is for me. Father Satrang stressed at All Saints that the word became flesh and dwelt among us full of grace and truth. The virgin birth is a way of affirming Jesus as the incarnate son of God. This part of the creed really came alive for me at All Saints back in the mid 1970's.

4. **Under Pontius Pilate, He was crucified, died, and was buried.**

This statement in the creed is important to me in my life for two reasons:

- 1) It shows that our belief is based on an actual historical event. Jesus was crucified, died, and buried. Our belief is not just in an idea; it actually happened.
- 2) I do not want to become like Pontius Pilate--getting rid of Jesus because he's politically inconvenient. Each of us has a potential to treat Jesus the way Pontius Pilate did.

5. **He descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again.**

This phrase in the creed is an important part of my life because I continually hear people ask, "Isn't your religion so narrow, that you only believe a few Christians will be saved?" I counter this with: "Jesus is the gift of salvation for all people. Jesus is the salvation for the whole world: both the living and the dead." Everyone is given a chance to be saved. The third day is not just a statement of what happened in the past; Jesus's resurrection happens in me. As the old Bill Gaither song says, "Because he lives, I can face tomorrow."

6. **He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father.**

The ascension has not been as important to me as many statements in the creed for many years, but in recent years it has become more important to me that Jesus is seated at the right hand of the father and intercedes on behalf of us to the Father.

7. **He will come again to judge the living and the dead.**

In 2005 I attended Oxford Theology Summer School where I came to realize that I can look forward to being judged by God. When someday I stand before God's judgement, I will see the true value of my life. I will see how important my life on earth has been. After being chastised for my failings, I will be covered with Christ's righteousness, and through His righteousness I will be welcomed into Heaven.

8. **I believe in the Holy Spirit,**

I heard about the Holy Spirit in church for years and I believed in the Holy Spirit as an idea, but it wasn't until I came to St. Patrick's in Thousand Oaks in the late 1980's and participated in a Charismatic Prayer Group that I really began to experience the power of the Holy Spirit in my own life. I also attended a workshop given by Peter Wagner at Fuller Theological Seminary on the gifts of the spirit. I brought the workshop back to St. Patrick's and taught on the gifts of the holy spirit. This part of the creed became meaningful to me at that time.

9. **the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints,**

I have come to realize over time how important it is to be in fellowship with people in the local church as well as people in the larger community of Christ. Furthermore, the fellowship of the church includes people who have died and have lived holy lives and given us wise teaching from the past. These people are in heaven and by being in Christ's church on earth we are in some way in fellowship with them as well. The community of Christ of both the living and the dead is a community in which God's plan of salvation is unfolding. I am very thankful to be in Christ's church and in communion with all the saints.

10. **the forgiveness of sins,**

In my own life, when I received Jesus as my savior at the age of fourteen, I came to realize that my sins are forgiven. To talk about the forgiveness of sins as an abstract concept is one thing. To know inside of you that your sins are forgiven is another thing. It's important that we personally know of the forgiveness of our own sins.

11. **the resurrection of the body,**

When I was in a philosophy class at UC Berkeley studying Plato, I learned that Plato believed in the existence of the soul after death, but that the body ceased to exist at the point of death. Plato had no concept of the resurrection of the body. I realized that I didn't want to be a disembodied soul after I died. What a horrible existence! I think of ghosts in horror movies that are struggling because they don't have a body. Simply believing in life after death is not believing in the resurrection of the body. We believe that we're going to be given a glorious resurrected body that will be perfect in every way in a resurrected new world. I look forward to living in my new body in a new world.

12. **and the life everlasting. Amen.**

"The life everlasting" is not a continuation of earthly existence forever. I once saw a movie of how terrible it would be to live forever here on earth. Everything would be so boring and repetitive, you would want to die, but couldn't. That would be torture. But the life everlasting is a different type of life. It's living forever in the resurrection life that God gives us. This life will be filled with new and wonderful things and will be anything but boring and repetitive. God is the one who says in Revelation 21, "Behold, I make all things new."

I have given you some of my personal experiences of trying to insert myself into the creed. It's my hope that you will go through the twelve points and look for your experiences and insert yourself into the creed.

2019 Pastoral Plan of San Diego Episcopal Cursillo Ministry

Preamble

The purpose of Episcopal Cursillo in the United States of America is to bring Christ into our environments and thereby change the world for Christ, using the proven strategies and methods of Cursillo.

Strategy

To achieve this purpose, we will use Pre-Cursillo to identify active Christians having the potential to influence their environments, sending them to Three-Day weekends to renew their Christian commitment to the responsibilities of their Baptismal Covenant and to teach the Cursillo Method; and we will use Fourth Day programs to encourage Cursillistas who have completed Three-Day weekends to carry out apostolic witness in their environments.

Method

Cursillo empowers Cursillistas to bring Christ to the world and, through a continued commitment of a Rule of Life including Piety, Study, action, Group Reunion, and Ultreya enables them to persevere in the Fourth Day as Ambassadors for Christ in their environments.

Pastoral Plan

To discern God's will for the place and vision of the Cursillo Ministry in The Episcopal Diocese of San Diego, the Secretariat members of the ministry will work under the direction of the Bishop Susan Brown Snook to undertake the following for a period of one year from this date:

Study our own environment:

- How are we implementing the Cursillo Method?
- How are we encouraging our members to live out their Fourth Day and bring Christ to their environments?
- How can we attract younger participants?
- How can we attract cross-cultural participants?

Plan and carry out our ministry in these ways:

- Promote visible Cursillo support and servanthood in the Diocese and the greater community.
- Support the annual Diocesan convention.
- Continue to lead and support Ecumenical Ultreyas.
- Pledge \$1,440 to the National Cursillo committee.
- Support at least one outreach project each year.
- Submit articles to be included in the Diocesan Newspaper.

Submit articles to be included in the Diocesan Newspaper.
Continue the goal of eight Ultreyas per year.

Encourage all Cursillistas to promote Cursillo by wearing nametags and being prepared to talk about the ministry on Cursillo Sunday.

The Bishop will encourage Clergy to attend our Weekends.

Encourage participation in Cursillo activities of Group Reunion and Ultreyas. Encourage participation in the servant community as our Leaders School, operation under the direction of the Secretariat.

Encourage people to attend Cursillo Weekends, especially people in the following categories:

People in the age group of 18-49

Post-newcomers (1-3 years in a church).

Cross-cultural candidates beginning with Hispanics.

Brothers and Sister of the Evangelical Lutheran Church.

Utilize social media as a method to promote the Cursillo ministry.

The next Cursillo Sunday will be January 19, 2020 (third Sunday).
